- 1. Matthew 9:10 says, "While Jesus was having dinner at Matthew's house, many tax collectors and sinners came and ate with Him and His disciples".
 - a. Who were the tax collectors? Who were the sinners? Who do you think this verse referred to when it says "sinners"?
 - b. What implications do you see in "many tax collectors and sinners came and ate with Him and His disciples"?
 - c. Imagine that while we are enjoying our fellowship with the brothers and sisters we know and love, and out of the blue, some strangers pop in and join us ...
 - i. What is your first reaction (expressed or not expressed)? How does your initial reaction make our visitors felt?
 - ii. Does our reaction toward strangers reflect how far/ close we are from the ideal of being an outward-focused, Evangelistic Church?
- 2. Jesus was questioned by the Pharisees that, "He eats with tax collectors and sinners?" (Matthew 9:11)
 - a. ... Compare and contrast the difference(s) between "Jesus eats with the tax-collectors and sinners" and sometimes the need to share a table with strangers in a packed restaurant in our modern day.
 - b. ... How should you treat people who are different from you?
- 3. Jesus said, "It is not the healthy who need a doctor, but the sick." And He said, "For I have not come to call the righteous, but sinners."
 - a. We believe that everyone needs Jesus! If so, then who are the "healthy" and who are the "sick" if only the sick need a doctor/ Jesus?
 - b. We believe that Jesus is without sin. If the holy, unblemished, and sinless Jesus said, "For I have not come to call the righteous, but sinners," what does this statement imply about you and me?
